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


LINDEN TREE

- Yes, all trees lower their branches during the night, and the position of the leaves also changes.




- Do you remember any special days?

Tree : Yes of course! Give some to your friends too.

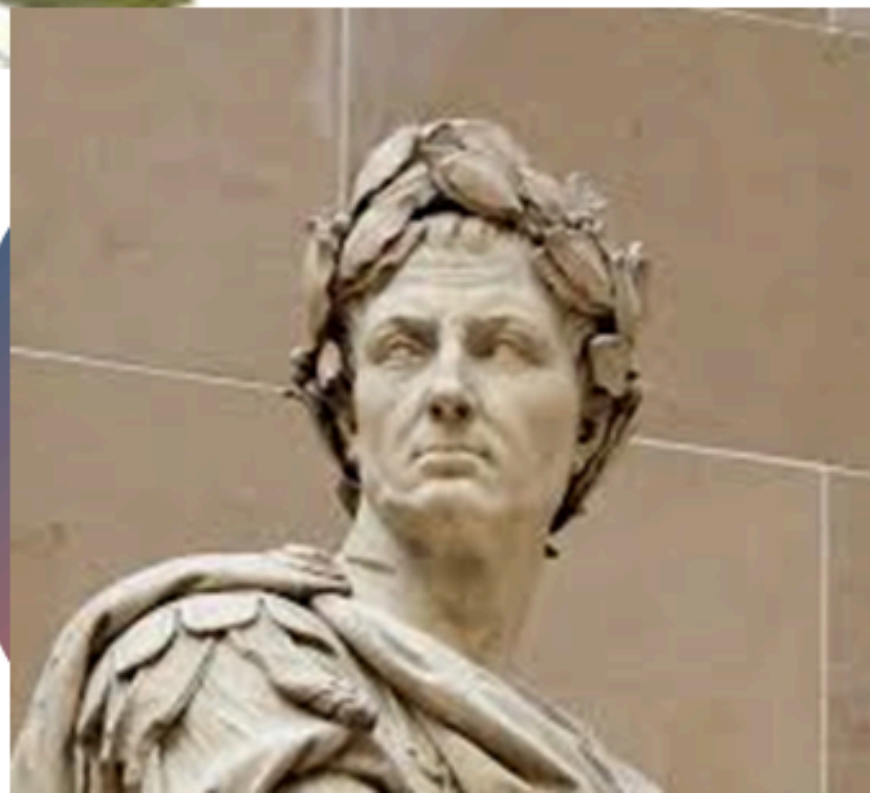
Reporter : How can I make use of these leaves?

Reporter : So nice of you, See you in end of Summer

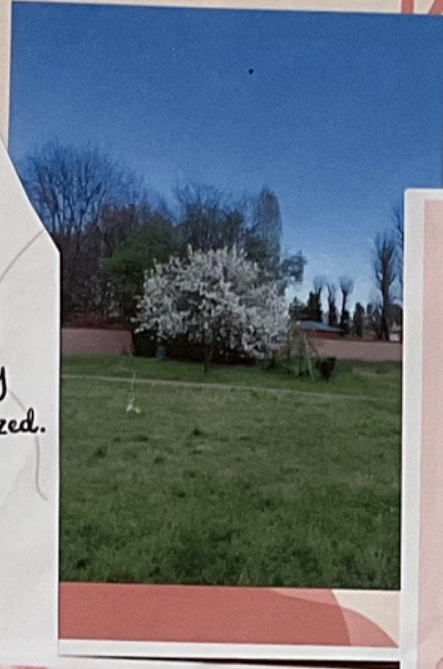
Tree : Yes, I will be waiting here for you!
